CHRISTMAS PARTY TO SUPPORT USMC "TOYS FOR TOTS" CAMPAIGN

Brother Knights attending the Dec. 3 Christmas party are asked to bring a new, unwrapped toy to the event for donation to the U.S. Marine Corps' annual "Toys for Tots" campaign. The toys will be collected and delivered to the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve unit in Raleigh for distribution to needy children in the Raleigh area.

A motion to support the "Toys for Tots" campaign was made at the Nov. 6 business meeting, and it passed unanimously. Toys can be for either boys or girls of any age. The only requirement is that the toys be new and unwrapped.

"This is a great way to do something for others at a special time of the year, and contributing for the local community's benefit makes it even more special," said Grand Knight Dave Vogelpohl.

The primary goal of "Toys for Tots" is to deliver, through a shiny new toy at Christmas, a message of hope to needy youngsters that will motivate them to grow into responsible, productive, patriotic citizens and community leaders, according to the organization's official Website <u>www.toysfortots.org</u>.

"Toys for Tots" began in 1947 when Maj. Bill Hendricks, U.S. Marine Corps Reserve, and a group of Marine Reservists in Los Angeles collected and distributed 5,000 toys to needy children. The idea came from Bill's wife, Diane. In the fall of 1947, Diane handcrafted a Raggedy Ann doll and asked Bill to deliver the doll to an organization that would give it to a needy child at Christmas. When Bill determined that no agency existed, Diane told Bill that he should start one. He did. The 1947 pilot project was so successful that the Marine Corps adopted "Toys for Tots" in 1948 and expanded it into a nationwide campaign.

The Marine Toys for Tots Foundation is a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit charity. Donations are tax-deductible.

There will also be a silent auction for the centerpieces at each table, with the high bidder taking home the centerpiece. Proceeds of the silent auction will go to "Toys for Tots." Payment must be in cash or by check. Donations made for the centerpieces are tax-deductible less a fair-market amount for the actual centerpiece.

OPERATION LAMB PROCEEDS FALL SHORT OF \$25K GOAL

Operation LAMB Project Officer Brother Tom Dupree reported that as of the Nov. 6 business meeting, Operation LAMB had netted \$19,522.59 versus the goal for this year of \$25,000. The current proceeds are still higher than they were last year. As of the end of December 2005, proceeds were \$17,760.

And there is still some money outstanding. Similar to last year, Brother Dupree will be sending out a letter to each Brother Knight to launch the personal campaign phase of the drive. Last year, the personal appeal to Brother Knights brought in another \$1,200.

"The personal campaign gives Brother Knights who were unable to assist in the October campaign or others who would like to complement their service hours the chance to make a personal contribution," said Grand Knight Dave Vogelpohl. "While it does not appear likely that we will reach the \$25,000 goal, I would still like to see us get closer to it."

Brother Knights can expect a letter announcing the personal campaign shortly. The Operation LAMB 2006 campaign officially ends Dec. 31, 2006, and the Council is still looking at other options to reach the goal.

ST. FRANCIS ACCEPTS 50/50 SPLIT FOR RBC CENTER CONCESSION STAND STAFFING AND REVENUE

St. Francis KoC Council 9709 has accepted an offer from St. Catherine's of Wake Forest KoC Council 11234 to furnish half the staffing for RBC Center concession stand events beginning Nov. 18. The agreement means that Council 9709 will nearly double the amount of money it was getting previously by sending five people per event rather than three.

"So far, for three games this year with three people per game, we received \$463. If we had had five people per game, we would have received \$804," said Brother Ralph Guenther, RBC Center project manager.

The annual difference will be even more impressive. Furnishing three people per game for the entire season would have netted \$3,900. With three people per game for the first seven games and five people per game for the remaining 19 events, the anticipated revenue will be over \$6,200.

And, should the Canes make it into the playoffs, the revenue will be even more. Last year Council 9709 only participated in 16 events plus the playoffs, netting \$5,000 for providing only two people per event.

"We can do a lot of good with that extra revenue," said Brother Guenther.

Attire for working at the RBC Center is a Council 9709 shirt and cap (see page 3), black shoes and black pants. Free parking is provided for volunteers in Lot C. Concession workers do not cook. They send orders to the kitchen, distribute the concession products and man cash registers. Workers arrive two hours before game time (5 p.m. for a 7 p.m. start), and the evening is finished around 9 p.m. after final inventory and clean up.

One or two Brother Knights are still needed for the following dates: Nov. 18, 24, 30; Dec. 2, 20, 29; Jan. 6, 18, 20, 26; Feb. 3, 20; March 13, 22, 24, 30 and April 7.

"We are over 80 percent of the way there for five people per event. All we need to fill are 28 more slots," said Brother Guenther. Brother Knights interested in participating can contact Brother Guenther at 572-5342 or via e-mail at <u>Ralph.guenther@prodigy.net</u>.
