BASKETBALL FREE THROW CONTEST SET FOR FEB. 13



Council 9709 will hold its annual Basketball Free Throw Contest for youth aged 10-14 on Saturday, Feb. 13, 9:00 a.m. - noon, in the Clare Hall gym. All Saints Council 9709 runs both the Council competition and the District #9 competition for three area KofC Councils at the event.

Last year 32 boys and girls each shot 15 free throws. St. Francis winners were determined by the most free throws made by St. Francis children by age group. District winners were selected from all three Councils by the highest number of free throws made during head-to-head competition. One participant from St. Francis, Ben Zemonek, age 10, won the state championship for his age group.

The Basketball Free Throw Contest is an annual event run statewide by the North Carolina State Council of the Knights of Columbus, and the state competition will be held March 6 in Burlington.

Brother Mike Wrzesien, the Youth Committee Chairman, will be organizing the event. He will need about 10-12 brothers to help in registering and scoring the participants as well as shagging basketballs. Brother Mike encourages his fellow Knights to join in the fun.

"Working with the youth of our community is very rewarding. The free throw contest is a competitive event, yet I am always amazed at how the boys and girls support their peers and celebrate each other's accomplishments," said Brother Wrzesien.

Council 9709 is required to submit the following reports to Supreme and State detailing the level of participation in Council activities by the membership and the expenditure of Council funds:

Report of Officers Chosen for Term July 1, 20 to June 30, 20 (Form #185) – A listing of the new officers for the fraternal year due by July 1 of the new fraternal year.

Service Program Personnel Report for the Term July 1, 20 to June 30, 20 (Form #365) – A listing of the new Committee Chairmen for the fraternal year due by August 1 of the new fraternal year.

Youth Leader for the Term Report (Form #4348) – The Council is required to submit a report with information concerning the Youth Committee Chairman to Supreme as part of a background check.

Semi-Annual Council Audit Report (Form #1295) – A reconciliation of Membership, Cash Transactions and Assets and Liabilities for the previous six months. Reports are due August 15 and Feb. 15.

Soccer Challenge Participation Report (Form #4567) and Free Throw Championship Report (Form **#FT-1**)— A summary of the number of youth participating in the annual Soccer Challenge due by Dec. 1 and the Free Throw Championship due by Jan. 31 of the fraternal year.

Annual Survey of Fraternal Activity Report (Form #1728) – A summary of the membership's participation in Council as well as non-Council activities due Jan. 31. Much of the input for this report comes directly from the membership. Form #1728A can be used to record individuals' inputs concerning their charitable activities for the past year. Council 9709 typically sends out an e-mail to the membership to collect this data.

Partnership Profile Report with Special Olympics (Form #4584) – A summary of participation in Special Olympics programs at the local, regional and state levels for the year due by Jan. 31 each year.

RSVP Refund/Plaque Application (Form #2863) - A summary of the moral and financial support provided seminarians throughout the year. The report is due June 30 each year.

Colombian Award Application (Form #SP7) – A summary of activities conducted in each of the five program areas: Church, Community, Council, Family and Youth. The submission of the Annual Survey of Fraternal Activity Report and the Service Program Personnel Report are prerequisites for submitting this report, which is due June 30 of each year.

COUNCIL'S 2009 LAMB TOTAL REACHES \$25,879.27

The final total for Council 9709's Operation LAMB drive for 2009 is \$25,879.27. The total includes \$210 donated at the O'Charley's breakfast Saturday, Dec. 12, as well as some \$2,855 in personal contributions made by Council members in December. Contributions received after Dec. 31 will be applied to the 2010 LAMB campaign.

Council 9709 raised some \$26,224 for calendar year 2008. The goal assigned All Saints Council by the State Council for 2009 was \$27,011.
