

COUNCIL HONORED AT STATE ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING

All Saints Council 9709 picked up two top awards and one fifth place in the individual program categories at the State Organizational Meeting held in Greensboro over the weekend of July 10-11.

The Council received a first place plaque in the Division 4 competition for its Refund Support Vocations Program (RSVP) under the Church category and another for its Scholarship Program under the Youth category. The Council also received fifth place recognition for its Social Gatherings Program under the Family category.

In addition, All Saints Council was recognized as the fourth largest contributor of pledges to Room at the Inn, a program directed at helping pregnant college-age women avoid abortion, have a child and continue their studies. The Council was credited with pledging some \$14,500 to date, some \$10,000 of that coming from the Council's five-year pledge and the rest from 10 individual Council members.

"This is an important program that we as a

Council have chosen to support, but the Council has only pledged half of what the program has asked for," said Grand Knight Dick Bridges. "The other half was left for individual pledges, and I was pleasantly surprised to see the generosity of our Brothers who have pledged so much to date."

Room at the Inn hopes to raise \$1 million by October, although it was only about a third of the way there as of the Organizational Meeting. A representative from Room at the Inn will be invited to attend an upcoming Social Gathering to address Council members and spouses.

In addition, the Council was recognized for selling the fifth most State Vacation Raffle Tickets of any North Carolina Council during the spring drive. Council 9709 sold 688 tickets this year, up from 675 last year when it also placed fifth in the State.

42 ATTEND AUGUST 10 ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING

Some 42 Brother Knights attended the All Saints Council's fraternal year 2010-2011 Organizational Meeting August 10. Attendees enjoyed pizza from Schiano's and had the opportunity learn about the Council's plans for the year and pledge their service to the Council's Program Directors.

"We asked for a *pledge*, not a commitment," emphasized Grand Knight Dick Bridges. "We understand that the Council is fourth among a Knight's priorities of Church, Family and Work. FOR THE FIRST DEGREE KNIGHT . . . STAR COUNCIL

Star Council status is the highest award a Knights of Columbus Council can receive from Supreme. To achieve Star status, a Council must excel in three areas: membership recruiting, insurance membership recruiting and service thereby achieving the requirements for the Father McGivney Award, the Founders' Award and the Colombian Award.

The Father McGivney Award is presented to Councils that achieve a seven percent net gain in membership for the fraternal year. Resignations and lost members add to the number of new members needed to achieve that goal. New membership transactions must be received, processed and recorded at Supreme by June 30 of the end of the fraternal year to count for that fraternal year.

The Founders' Award is presented to Councils that achieve a 2.5 percent net increase in new insurance members for the fraternal year. Reactivated inactive insurance members can count toward both membership and insurance membership goals. New insurance additions must be received, processed and released at Supreme by June 30 of the end of the fraternal year to count for that fraternal year.

The Colombian Award is presented to Councils who conduct at least four activities in the areas of Church, Community, Council, Family, Pro-Life and Youth. Councils must complete and forward KofC Report #1436 to Supreme no later than June 3

Councils must complete and forward KofC Report #1436 to Supreme no later than June 30 to qualify for this award.

ALL SAINTS WELCOMES FOUR NEW MEMBERS

Council 9709 inducted four new Brother Knights at a special ceremony Thursday, August 12. Welcome to new Brothers John Buyarski, Jim Holler, Chuck Lally and Diego Ortiz! In addition, Brother Ron Monti's request for reactivation was accepted by the Council, which also counts toward the membership goal. The four new members and one reactivation reduce the number of new Knights required for the Council to achieve Star Status to 20 (see article below).

"This year we will have a number of 1st Degree Ceremonies not connected with regular business meetings in order to keep the amount of time devoted to a business meeting to about an hour," said Grand Knight Dick Bridges.

There will, however, still be 1st Degree Ceremonies conducted in conjunction with business meetings in September and December 2010 and in March and June of 2011, if needed.

In addition, the Council plans on holding four 2nd

Degree Ceremonies not connected with business meetings during this fraternal year. The final schedule for those ceremonies will be announced once the 2^{nd} Degree Team has been certified, something that should occur in early September.

COUNCIL NEEDS 20 MORE RECRUITS FOR STAR STATUS

For fraternal year 2010-2011, Council 9709 will need to find at least 20 more new members for the Father McGivney Award for membership and five new insurance members for the Founders' Award for new insurance members. The Council also needs to achieve the requirements of the Colombian Award for service, although that has never presented a problem for the All Saints Council in the past.

"The membership goal is doable, as we showed last year by recruiting some 30 new members," said Grand Knight Dick Bridges. "Still, we need everyone's participation to achieve the membership goal for this year."

Council 9709 finished fraternal year 2009-2010 with a total membership of 223, which under normal circumstances would mean a membership goal of 15; however, the Council will be dropping at least 10 members who did not pay dues last year and submitted their resignations from the Order. Resigning members add to the current fraternal year goal.

Membership Director Tru Hall is making arrangements to support the Lifelong Faith Formation Ministry at their Family Biblefest on August 29. Knights will cook and serve hot dogs, and the Council will set up a membership information table as well. In addition, Grand Knight Dick Bridges will address the Men's Ministry monthly breakfast meeting on Sept. 7 at 7 a.m. in the Founders Room. The focus of that talk will be on joining the Knights. Brothers Shawn Bayle and Tru Hall are also working a Parish-wide pancake breakfast for Sunday, Sept. 19 after the 9:30 and 11:30 a.m. Masses in the new Community Center. Knights wishing to get involved in any of these activities should contact Brothers Shawn Bayle, Dick Bridges or Tru Hall.

"If we are going to achieve Star Council status this year, it will take a lot of effort by the Membership Committee, and I hope more Brothers will sign on to help," said Brother Bridges.

Star Council status is also contingent upon the Council meeting the requirement for the Founders Award for new insurance members and the Colombian Award for at least four activities each under Church, Community, Council, Family and Youth. The Council has never had difficulty achieving the requirements for the Colombian Award.

The Council's goal for this fraternal year to meet the requirements of the Founders Award for new members is five. The Council has already added two new insurance members this fraternal year, and there are at least two other Brothers who have expressed strong interest in becoming insurance members.

State has established a statewide goal of 1,200 members for fraternal year 2010-2011. For fraternal year 2009-2010 North Carolina Councils added a total of 1,069 new Knights to the Order.

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16 SUPPORT MIGRANT MINISTRY FOOD DRIVE

Some 16 Knights dropped off 33 bags of food for the Migrant Ministry Food Drive conducted at St. Francis over the weekend of July 24-25. The drive was sponsored by the Church's Migrant Ministry and advertised the weekend of July 17-18.

"We sent out an e-mail on this one because it was publicized so late," said Grand Knight Dick Bridges. "It's important that we make an effort to support our Church's food drives, because we will get credit for a contribution for the Order's 'Food for Families' program for participating."

This month State will be allocating some \$9,900 received from Supreme to North Carolina's two Dioceses, some \$5,200 to the Raleigh Diocese and \$4,700 to the Charlotte Diocese as a result of State Councils'



participation in or conduct of food drives under the Food for Families program, according to State Food for Families Director Ray Wycoff. Supreme had set aside \$1 million to distribute to State Councils achieving a goal of 25 percent participation by of their Councils. North Carolina had 40 percent participation.

WHY I BOUGHT THE ANNUITY

I just invested \$10,000 in a Knights of Columbus Annuity. I did this for a number of reasons, not the least of which was to add myself as an Insurance Member for this fraternal year's Founders Award quota of six. At present, the Council has two new Insurance Members, which leaves four more to meet our goal.

But I also invested in a KofC Annuity for more practical reasons, not the least of which is that my money will be earning a minimum of 3.25 percent (three percent for less than \$10,000) guaranteed for the life of the instrument. Once I have had the money invested for one year, the interest rate will jump to whatever the Board of Directors decides at its quarterly meetings. Currently, that interest rate is 3.9 percent. That sure beats the less than one percent I can get on my investment account or one-year certificates of deposit. It may be a little lower than what I could get in the bond market, but the annuity is a lot safer to my way of thinking in these economic times.

My plan is to hold onto this annuity for seven years, the minimum holding period for withdrawal without penalty. After that, I may cash it in and reinvest the money elsewhere, annuitize the total amount over the rest of my life time under actuarial tables or just let it roll. Should I outlive the actuarial tables' prediction for my life span, the annuity will continue to pay even beyond what I invested and earned as interest. If I die, my wife will have the option of taking a lump sum or annuitizing it herself over a ten-year period.

If for whatever reason I need the money earlier, I can withdraw the money within the first two years with a penalty of five percent, the next two years with a penalty of four percent or additional percentage point per year over the next three years until it zeroes out after seven years. I can withdraw up to 50 percent without penalty for medical reasons. I can begin withdrawing ten percent per year after one year, again without penalty.

I could have set up an annuity with payments over time and had the contributions treated as an IRA, Roth IRA or SEP with the tax advantages, but that is something I do not need for my current circumstances. When I withdraw the money, I will pay taxes only on the interest I received. If I take monthly or annual payments, I will receive a portion of principal and a portion representing interest paid. I will only pay tax on the interest.

The annuity involves no fee, either for set up or annually. The money is invested 80 percent in AAA bonds, 14 percent in Mutual Funds with investment strategies consistent with the Catholic religion and six percent in Church loans.

SEPTEMBER BLOOD DRIVE SEEKS 125 BLOOD DONORS

All Saints Council is looking for 165 donors for its Saturday, Sept. 25 fall blood drive for the American Red Cross. The drive will be held in Assisi Community Center from 8 a.m. until 1 p.m.

"We hope to get at least 125 units," said Brother Tom DuPree, who with his wife, Elaine has headed up the Council's sponsorship since 1995. "There is an urgent need for Type O, B and A negative donors, although the Red Cross will accept and use any blood type donated."

Donors can sign up online at <u>www.redcrossblood.org</u>. Click on "Search for Sponsor" and enter Sponsor Code 16141. Find an available time slot and sign up. There will also be the usual sign up opportunity in the Stewardship Room or Breezeway after weekend Masses on Sept. 11-12 and 17-18. Donors will be automatically entered into a drawing for a \$1,000 gift card.

The American Red Cross requires that donors be at least 17 (16 with parent permission) years of age, weigh at least 110 pounds and be in reasonably good health.
