

THREE JOIN ALL SAINTS COUNCIL OCT. 5

Council 9709 gained three new members at a 1st Degree Ceremony conducted in conjunction with its Oct. 5 business meeting. Welcome to new Brothers Jim Falanga, Rich Spangenberg and Bill Zahn! Brother John Jones was also accepted as a transfer at the meeting.

These three new Knights bring the total number of new recruits to seven for this fraternal year. But even with an additional credit for two reactivations, the Council still needs at least 26 more new Knights to reach its goal for Star Council status for fraternal year 2010-2011. The Council's original Supreme-assigned goal of 15 was increased by 11 resignations from fraternal year 2009-2010 and six more so far this fraternal year. There are also three Brothers who are being suspended for nonpayment of dues. After suspension actions are initiated, they add to the Council's recruiting goal for the year, even if they pay their dues later.

"The loss of this many members is distressing," said Grand Knight Dick Bridges. "However, I think the Council as a whole will benefit from dropping members who no longer wish to support the Council in any way."

FOR THE FIRST DEGREE KNIGHT . . . FR. McGIVNEY GUILD

Father Michael J. McGivney, who founded the Knights of Columbus in New Haven, Conn., in 1882, is a unique model for today's Catholic and today's Catholic Priest because of his attention to the social ills and injustices of his day and his collaboration with the laity. He was zealous for the life of union with God through prayer and the Sacraments, and he would have been right at home in today's world. He was then and would be today an eager Apostle for the Gospel of life and a determined foe of the culture of death.

In view of his legacy, the Order of the Knights of Columbus has established The Father Michael J. McGivney Guild to promote the cause for the canonization of its founder, Father Michael J. McGiveny. The goal of the Guild is to spread the good word about his holiness of life, to encourage devotion to his memory and to seek his intercession before the throne of God. The Guild serves as a clearing house for information about Father McGivney, his life and works and any favors attributed to his intercession.

Membership in the Guild is open to anyone who wishes to share in this mission of making known the life and work of Father McGivney and of



encouraging devotion to his memory. All one needs to do is fill out the application and mail it in to become enrolled. There is no charge to enroll, although donations are accepted. Enrollment can also be done via the web by logging on to <u>www.fathermcgivney.org</u>.

COUNCIL EXCEEDS OPERATION LAMB GOAL!



All Saints Council 9709's Operation LAMB collections over the weekends of Sept. 24-26 and Oct. 1-3 totaled some \$11,362.07, bringing the Council's total collection for the calendar year to \$27,570.37, exceeding the State-established goal of \$25,656. This is the first time in three years that the Council has exceeded its goal, although the Council did rank third in the State for those two years.

For the Sept. 24-26 weekend, the Council collected \$4,060.49. All 53 three-hour slots were filled. Some 28 Knights from Council 9709 along with five spouses and children filled 44 slots, Knights from St. Luke the Evangelist Council 12455 filled seven slots and the Arc of Wake County filled in for two. Money collected by St. Luke's will go into the Operation LAMB fund under their Council banner.

"St. Luke's had asked if they could work locations that we had arranged if we could not fill our slots," said Council 9709's Operation LAMB Director Brother Dave Vogelpohl. "The money they collected would have gone uncollected had we not been able to fill the slots, and all Operation LAMB money goes into the same fund."

For the Oct. 1-3 weekend, the Council collected \$7,301.58. Some 39 Brother Knights and six spouses and children filled 75 slots of the 86 available, Knights from St. Luke's two slots and the Arc of Wake County two slots. Seven slots went vacant.

SEPT. 25 BLOOD DRIVE NETS 151 UNITS

All Saints Council 9709 helped the Red Cross collect 151 units of blood Saturday, Sept. 25, at the second Council-sponsored blood drive this year. The Red Cross goal was to collect 125 units.

Some 16 Knights donated blood themselves, and 15 Brother Knights and wives turned in some 210 total volunteer hours in conjunction with solicitation, set up, execution and tear down.

The Council also collected \$31.36 for Operation LAMB at the drive, which was added to the total for the weekend. Many thanks to Brother Tom and Elaine DuPree for their hard work on this project. *(see story above)*

COUNCIL SERVES DINNER IN LOUISBURG

Twelve Knights, four wives and three young adults served 204 hamburgers, 119 hot dogs, salads, fresh fruit and dessert to about 150 migrant workers and their families after a 1:30 p.m. Mass Sunday, Sept. 12, at Our Lady of the Rosary Church in Louisburg. The dinner was made possible by the generous contributions from 27 Parishioners and 22 Knights of about \$75 in cash as well as the salads, fresh fruit, desserts and soft drinks.

"This may be the best meal they get this week," said Migrant Ministry Representative and Brother Knight Tom Carlson.

The Ministry organizes a dinner for the migrants after Mass one day a month from June through September. This is the third September dinner the Council has sponsored. "The Knights have been fantastic," Brother Carlson said.

Brother John Wagner has been selected as Knight of the Month for October for his efforts in helping the Council help the USO. Brother John approached the Store Manager at the Lowe's on Glenwood Avenue about getting a floor model refrigerator that the Council could purchase for the USO to replace an irreparable refrigerator at the RDU Airport facility. The \$1,200 refrigerator had been marked down to \$860, but when Brother John told the Store Manager that the Council had only budgeted \$500 for the year for the USO, he marked it down to \$450 so that even with tax, the purchase could be made within budget. Brother John's extra effort enabled the Council to vote down a motion made at the August business to increase the budget line for the USO to up to \$1,200.

Brother John has been a Knight since April 2006 and took his 4th Degree in October 2009. He is a frequent attendee at Council business meetings and volunteers for LAMB despite working irregular hours at his job at Lowe's.

Brother John came to Raleigh from the Youngstown, Ohio, area in 1995. Son John lives in Charleston, S.C., is a Citadel graduate, recently married and is a 2nd Degree Knight. Daughter Laura is a graduate of Meredith College in Raleigh and is currently working in Raleigh as a personal trainer.

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44 ATTEND SEPTEMBER SOCIAL FOR RATI

Some 44 Brother Knights and spouses attended the Sept. 21 Social Gathering at Casa Carbone and were treated to a presentation by Brother Tom Mathis on the Room at the Inn (RATI) initiative. Room at the Inn was instituted to support young mothers of college age faced with an unexpected pregnancy so that they can continue their education, work and get themselves established during the first two years of their children's lives.

Brother Tom explained that the North Carolina initiative, of which he is a founder, hopes to put a Room at the Inn Center on every college campus as an alternative to the Planned Parenthood offices now there. He hopes that the North Carolina KofC Councils can make enough donations to earn the naming rights for the center being built in Charlotte. If every Knight in the State can commit to pledging \$100 over five years, the Order will be able to name that Center the Father Michael J. McGivney Center.

Deputy Grand Knight Kent Siefkes made a presentation of a \$2,000 check from All Saints Council to Brother Tom at the dinner, the third installment of a Council pledge for \$10,000 over five years. As of July 31, the Council had \$14,800 in pledges from the Council and 14 individuals. At least one other Brother made a pledge after hearing Brother Tom at the Social. More information on RATI and a pledge form are available on the Council website under "Events and Schedules."

Presentations at Social Gatherings will continue, courtesy of Brother Steve Becker, who as Lecturer is responsible for the Good of the Order portion of regular meetings. The Good of the Order has been incorporated into Social Gatherings so wives can be included and to shorten the time required for regular business meetings. The speaker for the Oct. 19 Social Gathering will be the Council's Field Agent Tim Kilpatrick. The Council plans to have a speaker from the North Carolina Special Olympics at the Nov. 16 Social at Manchester's as well. Also on the Social Gatherings calendar are the Christmas Party on Sunday, Dec. 12, another pancake breakfast and separate Social Gathering at O'Charley's in January and a wine tasting party in February.



To help educate consumers about the need for and value of adequate life insurance protection, the Life Insurance Market Research Association (LIMRA) has published the following five facts. These statistics are certainly worth considering.

Fact 1: Nearly three-fourths of North Americans agree that life insurance is the best way to protect loved ones in the event of premature death of the primary wage earner.

Fact 2: Twenty-four million households have no life insurance protection at all. Almost one third of adults have no life insurance protection.

Fact 3: Forty-four percent of all households either don't own life insurance and believe they should, or own life insurance and believe they need more. Among those that already own some life insurance, 40 percent believe they don't have enough.

Fact 4: One-fourth of primary wage earners feel they do not have a plan in place to provide a decent standard of living for their family if they died tomorrow. Twelve percent of families would immediately have trouble meeting everyday living expenses and another 15 percent would have difficulty keeping up after several months.

Fact 5: People would like to discuss life insurance with a qualified professional agent. They believe that buying life insurance is an important and complex financial decision. Half find it difficult to decide how much to buy, and 43 percent worry about making the wrong decision.

Grand Knight Dick Bridges and Deputy Grand Knight Kent Siefkes attended Pope John Paul II Council 13812's monthly business meeting in Durham Monday, Sept. 13, and delivered the "Traveling Gavel" brought to All Saints Council Sept. 7 by District Deputy Don Williams.

"It was good to see that the format for Council meetings is consistent among Councils," said Grand Knight Dick Bridges.

The Traveling Gavel's purpose is to foster fraternity among Councils in the Order, according to District Deputy Williams, who set up the schedule for District #9. Each Grand Knight is asked to take the gavel along with at least two interested members to another Council in the District. The visiting Grand Knight presents the gavel at the beginning of the meeting to the visited Council's Grand Knight, who uses the traveling gavel until he presents it to the next Council in the queue.

Council 13812 was to deliver the gavel Sept. 15 to Paul J. Trabeser Council 10910 from St. Thomas More in Chapel Hill, and Council 10910 was to complete the circuit by delivering the gavel Sept. 21 to Maria Immaculata Council 3390 from Immaculate Conception in Durham. From there District Deputy Williams will pass the gavel on to District #21 where it will continue its travels.

There are a number of gavels within each of four N.C. KofC Regions that circulate during the fraternal year.

33 KNIGHTS DONATE TO FEED-A-FAMILY DRIVE

Some 33 Brother Knights donated some 70 bags of groceries and \$280 cash to the St. Francis Feed-A-Family Drive for Catholic Parish Outreach conducted Sept. 25-26 and Oct. 2-3.

The donations will be added to the 33 bags of groceries donated in July by some 16 Knights for the Migrant Ministry Food Drive. A consolidated report of Council participation for the fraternal year will be sent to State and Supreme for the total amount donated to all food drives sponsored by the Church rather than the Council sponsoring its own drive.

The Order's Food for Families Program encourages each state jurisdiction to work local Parish Churches and other public places to collect food for local food banks. States that garner significant participation by their Councils were allocated a portion of a \$1 million fund last year. North Carolina received \$9,900, \$5,200 of which was p
