

STATE ADVOCATE PRESENTS COUNCIL DOUBLE STAR AWARD

State Advocate Colin Jorsch presented Past Grand Knight Tom DuPree with the Order's Double Star Award for fraternal year 2009-2010 at the Council's business meeting Dec. 7.

"It is only due to all your volunteering, hard work and sacrifice of your valuable time that our Council, you and I were able to be recognized for this high honor," Brother DuPree told Council members in an e-mail prior to the ceremony.

The State Advocate attended the entire meeting, including the 1st Degree Ceremony, and was effusive with his praise of the Council and all it was doing. "I am honored to be here," he said, adding that the Council's 1st Degree Team's execution of the ceremony was "the best performance I've seen in 13 years" of being a Knight.

Past Grand Knight Tom DuPree thanked the Council for all it did under his aegis, giving his fellow officers and Brothers credit for achieving the prestigious Double Star Award.

The Double Star Award is presented to a Council that recruits twice as many new Knights as its recruiting goal. All

FOR THE FIRST DEGREE KNIGHT . . . FOURTH DEGREE HIERARCHY



4th Degree Knights and their Assemblies report to the Supreme Master and a Board of Directors at a global level. There are 20 Provinces of Assemblies headed by a Supreme Master and 19 Vice Supreme Masters in the United States (15), Canada (3), Mexico (1) and the Philippines (1). Assemblies in North Carolina belong to the DeSoto Province, which covers Florida, North Carolina, South Carolina and Puerto Rico. Our Vice Supreme Master is PSD Robert J. Singer. Within each Province there are Districts headed by Masters that oversee the Assemblies. Our District Master is PSD Robert J. Grabasky.

Past and present Supreme and Vice Supreme Masters can be identified by their light blue-lined capes and blue-feathered chapeaus. Past or present District Masters have goldlined capes and gold-feathered chapeaus and carry a gold-accented sword. Each District also has a District Marshall, appointed by the District Master, who wears a green-lined cape and green-feathered chapeau. The District Marshall typically organizes and conducts 4th

Degree Exemplifications. Past or present Faithful Navigators who lead Assemblies wear white-lined capes and white-feathered chapeaus and carry a white-handled sword. Color Guard Commanders, appointed by Faithful Navigators, wear purple-lined capes and purple chapeaus. All 4th Degree Knights are entitled to wear red-lined capes and white-feathered chapeaus and carry a black-handled sword.

All 4th Degree Knights wear a baldric, which in the United States and the Philippines has red and blue stripes on a white background, as a part of the formal dress. Canada's baldric has red stripes, and Mexico's has red and green stripes.

COUNCIL GIVES \$500 TO PRESCHOOL AT HARVEST MOON

Grand Knight Dick Bridges and Cindy Nackashi presented a \$500 check to Director Nancy Bourke of The Franciscan Preschool (TFP) at the TFP's annual Harvest Moon Festival, Saturday, Nov. 6. Cindy's husband, Brother David Nackashi, died August 15, 2010, and the family had requested that in lieu of flowers, mourners donate money to the TFP in David's name. Council officers decided to include Cindy in the presentation of this year's donation in memory of Brother David.

This is the second year the Council has presented a donation to the TFP at Harvest Moon and supported the event by covering the fixed costs of and preparing the food served at the festival. This year the Council paid just over \$250 for 12 gals. of chili, 14 pans of macaroni and cheese and 300 hot dogs. Brothers Mike Darrow, Don Donaghy, wife Terri, Norm Tuomi and Mike Wrzesien cooked the chili the evening of Friday, Nov. 5. Brothers Shawn Bayle, wife Mary Beth, John Moster and Mike Supianoski served the food at the festival, which ran from 11 a.m.

TFP Director Nancy Bourke had prepared for 500 attendees, and the cold, rainy weather probably helped toward reaching that goal. After the event Brother Bayle took four pans of macaroni and cheese, 40 hot dogs and three gallons of chili to the RDU USO. Money raised at the Harvest Moon Festival is dedicated to the Fr. Dan Kenna Foundation and will also be used in developing a cooking curriculum for the TFP this year.

The Council's net profits from the annual barbecue provide the funding for this donation, the \$500 to The Franciscan Preschool and the \$1,000 education grant(s) to students at Cardinal Gibbons High School.

In addition, funds have also been applied in support of the Harvest Moon activity for The Franciscan Preschool and will be used to pay for awards to the winners of a poster/essay new year at TES

contest and spelling bee to be conducted early in the new year at TFS.

"For anyone who has not witnessed the opening prayer ceremony at TFS, I would highly recommend doing so," said Brother Bridges. "I was extremely impressed by the students' attentiveness and devotion."

JOEY BENNETT WINS \$1,000 COUNCIL SCHOLARSHIP

Parishioner Joey Bennett, a senior at Cardinal Gibbons High School (CGHS), accepted a check for \$1,000 at the beginning of the Council's business meeting Dec. 7 as this year's winner of the Council's annual CGHS scholarship.

There were four applicants this year for the scholarship, and the winner was chosen based upon grade point average, academic honors, letters of reference, community service and an essay on the influence of Catholic schools on morals and values in everyday decision-making. An additional five points was added if the applicant's father was a Knight. Joey's father is not a Knight (yet), but Joey's exceptional qualifications allowed him to edge out the competition even without those extra points.

The scholarship is funded from the net proceeds of the Council's annual barbecue, which are all dedicated to the Council's Catholic Education Fund. That fund has also provided grants to The Franciscan Preschool and The Franciscan School, both of whom have already received checks for \$500 each

There were two grants to CGHS students made in 2009 as well as a \$1,000 grant made at the request of Fr. Mark for another individual for continuing his Catholic education. Only one grant to a CGHS student was made in 2008 and 2010.

COUNCIL TASKED TO SELL 800 STATE VACATION RAFFLE TICKETS

Council 9709 has received its allocation of 800 State Vacation Raffle Tickets early this year. Counting the turkeys as one bag of groceries each, the Council has donated a total of 156 bags of groceries and \$355 in cash that will be submitted for credit under the Order's Food for Families Program at the end of the fraternal year.

The previous food drives not mentioned above were for the Migrant Ministry over the weekend of July 24-25 and the St. Francis Feed-A-Family food drive for Catholic Parish Outreach (CPO) over the weekends of Sept. 25-26 and Oct. 2-3. Some 16 Knights supported the Migrant Ministry food drive with 33 bags of food, and some 33 Knights donated 70 bags of groceries and \$280 at the CPO food drive.
