COUNCIL 9709 GETS TOP AWARD FOR PRO-LIFE CATEGORY AT STATE

All Saints Council took the top award in the Pro-Life category for Division 4 Councils at the State Midyear Meeting, Saturday, Jan. 22. The Council's submission was for its donation of \$1,500 to Birthchoice and attendance at the Benefit for Life Gala in October. The Council sponsored two 10-person tables and with 10 Knights and their wives and guests all but filled both tables.

"I was very honored to receive this award on behalf of our Council," said Grand Knight Dick Bridges. "It is always nice to be recognized for the good work that we do."

Council 9709 also took second place in the Membership category for hosting a Continental breakfast for the Raleigh Diocese Catholic Convocation on Oct. 16 and manning a Knights of Columbus information table that yielded two potential candidates and generated interest in possibly establishing a Council in Oriental, N.C. The Council was also recognized by State Membership Chairman John Nussbaum in his presentation to the delegates at the meeting as having reached 120 percent of its membership recruiting goal at the half year point.

Brother Tom Mathis also presented a progress report for the Pro-Life initiative Room at the Inn. Although only 581 N.C. Knights have pledged or donated money to the project and only 10 of 127 Councils have met or exceeded the goal of \$100 per member over five years, the project has pulled in some \$347,313 toward the goal of \$1 million. Council 9709 has pledged or donated \$15,428 to date, of which \$10,000 represents the Council's pledge. The rest of the donated money comes from 28 Knights in the Council. All Saints Council is at about 75 percent of goal, according to Mathis.

EIGHT MARCH FOR LIFE IN RALEIGH

Eight members of All Saints Council 9709 participated in the North Carolina Right to Life Rally and March for Life 2011 Saturday, Jan. 15. Themarch, which ran from Nash Square in downtown Raleigh past the State Legislature to the Sacred Heart Cathedral, included about 30 Knights in regalia, including four of Council 9709's Brother Knights.

Barbara Holt, President of North Carolina Right to Life, Inc., noted that some 30,596 abortions were done in the state during 2010 and promised to work with the new State Legislature for the passage of a "Woman's Right to Know" law. Similar laws already exist in Virginia and South Carolina, and the Informed Consent Law requiring that a woman considering an abortion receive information on alternatives to abortion has withstood the scrutiny of a Supreme Court case. The Virginia and South Carolina laws, according to Mrs. Holt, have cut abortions in those states by half.

FOR THE FIRST DEGREE KNIGHT . . . OPERATION LAMB

Operation LAMB is the single largest charitable activity conducted by the Knights of Columbus. Brother Knights in yellow aprons have been soliciting donations from passers by and doling out Tootsie Rolls all across the nation since 1974. Since its inception, the Operation LAMB program in North Carolina has raised over \$20 million for the intellectually disabled in the state. Thanks to the generosity of the state's residents, North Carolinian Knights have been raising almost \$1 million annually since 2008.

Brother Knights of Council 9709 solicit donations outside of grocery stores in the northwest Raleigh area. Eighty-five percent of what a Council collects is distributed to local charities. The remaining 15 percent is sent to the State Council where it is distributed to organizations supporting the intellectually handicapped in areas of North Carolina where no local Knights of Columbus Councils exist.

Last year Council 9709 collected a record \$27,745.78. All Saints added its collection for 2010 to the coffers of Father Price Council 2456, Our Lady of Lourdes Council 12025, St. Luke the Evangelist Council 12455 and St. Raphael Council 9880 for distribution to local organizations in Raleigh. Charitable organizations apply for funds from the local Knights of Columbus Councils through a panel with members of each Council represented.

A total of \$44,696.74 is being distributed to the Arc of Wake County, the Bill Scott Endowment Fund, the Frankie Lemmon School and Development Center, Hilltop Home, Community Partnerships Inc., the Tammy Lynn Center for Developmental Disabilities, the Triangle Down's Syndrome Network, the Wake Autism Society, Wake Enterprises, Learning Together and Nancy Frazier of Harris Creek Elementary School for field trips.

Operation LAMB derives its name from Christ's words in Matthew 25:48: "as you did it to one of the [L]east [A]mong [M]y [B]rethren, you did it to me."

COUNCIL CROWNS TFS SPELLING BEE CHAMPION

Some 11 students from The Franciscan School (TFS) participated in a Spelling Bee sponsored by the All Saints Council, Thursday, Jan. 20. Grand Knight Dick Bridges and Youth Director Mike Wrzesien presented sixth grader Meghan Hurley with the winner's certificate, a plaque donated by the Council and the latest edition of Merriam-Webster's Collegiate Dictionary, which is used as the final authority for the spellings of all the words in the competition. Meghan also won a free online powerspeak12 world language course from the K12 Company for either Spanish, Latin, French, Chinese or German.

Meghan moves on to the Wake County Spelling Bee competition sponsored by Raleigh's News & Observer to be held Feb. 26 at North Carolina State University. The winner of that competition will compete at the Scripps National Spelling Bee in Washington, D.C.

This is the second time in a year that Brother Mike has been singled out from the membership for his numerous contributions to the Council. Brother Mike worked a total of 15 shifts at the RBC Center in 2010, more than twice the number of shifts worked by any other Brother in the Council. He was selected as Knight of the Month for February 2010 for having pulled six shifts.

"I moved to Raleigh in April 2009, and a few months later I had the privilege to rejoin the Knights of Columbus, something I have enjoyed very much since. Their activities to the community and the things they take part in have made for many very enjoyable experiences for me," said Brother Mike. "The individuals I have met are beyond words, the unity they share is something I value above all. I look forward to many more years to come with the Knights."

Brother Mike originally became a Knight in Marianna, Fla., in the late 1990s but allowed his membership to lapse after suffering a brain aneurism, which left him in a coma for 17 days in June 2000. Wife Joyce was appointed his aide and attendant by the Veterans Administration and assisted him with his ensuing disability until she contracted lupus and died in March 2009. Brother Mike then moved to Raleigh to be closer to his sister, Shirley Edwards, and her husband Bill.

COUNCIL REPORTS RECORD CONTRIBUTIONS AND HOURS FOR 2010

The Annual Survey of Fraternal Activity Report submitted Jan. 22 to Supreme by Council 9709 reflects all-time high figures for charitable disbursements and volunteer hours.

"All Saints Council and its members have much to be proud of for all we did last year collectively and individually," said Grand Knight Dick Bridges. "We keep setting the bar higher and higher every year, but that's probably good given that the need for our charitable contributions and volunteering also continues to grow."

All Saints Council reported charitable disbursements from Council funds of some \$15,442 for calendar year 2010, up from \$12,849 in 2009. Combined with the \$27,745.78 collected during the 2010 Operation LAMB campaign, also up from the previous year's total of \$26,545.62, the Council amassed some \$43,187.58 for charitable causes this past year. Operation LAMB funds are maintained separately from the Council's monies. The breakdown of Council funds applied to charity included \$5,508 to Church activities, \$7,604 to Community activities and \$2,330 to Youth activities. Last year, the Council contributed \$4,088 to Church, \$4,734 to Community and \$4,207 to Youth activities. In 2009 the Council issued three \$1,000 scholarships; for 2010 that number dropped to one.

With 53 of over 237 members reporting volunteer hours, the Council recorded some 184 visits to the sick, 45 visits to the bereaved, 20 blood donors who gave the equivalent of 63 units of blood, nine Habitat for Humanity jobs in which Council members participated, 1,849 hours for Church, 3,085 hours for Community, 1,642 hours for Youth, 639 hours to Habitat for Humanity, 991 miscellaneous volunteer hours and 147 hours helping the sick. The total of 8,353 volunteer hours is slightly higher than last year's 7,975 volunteer hours with 51 Knights reporting.

All Saints Council 9709 also submitted its Partnership Profile Report with Special Olympics on Jan. 31. The Council reported a total of 437 volunteer hours by 78 volunteers at two State events this past year: the annual Special Olympics North Carolina summer aquatics competition in June and the bowling competition in December 2010.

2011 OPERATION LAMB DATES SET FOR SPRING



Assistant Operation LAMB Director Tim Stevens announced the dates for Council 9709's participation in Operation LAMB for the spring of calendar year 2011 at the Feb. 1 business meeting. Unlike in past years when the Council has concentrated its efforts on a single weekend, most of this year's schedule is spread out over the month of April 2011 and beyond.

"It was difficult coordinating dates at some stores this goround," said Brother Stevens. "Some stores, like the Brier Creek Walmart, would only allow us to reserve one day over a weekend.

However, while that makes the drive last longer, it also gives Brothers multiple opportunities to sign up for a day when it is convenient for them to participate."

The Council is scheduled to be at the Brier Creek Walmart on Sunday, April 17; Saturday, July 9 and Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 24-25. Brothers will be soliciting donations at the Glenwood Walmart on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, April 15-17 and the Walmart at Morrisville on Saturday and Sunday, April 2-3. The Council will be at the Harris Teeter in Morrisville on Sunday, April 17; Saturday, April 30 and Saturday, June 4, and at the Harris Teeter on Leesville Road on Sunday, April 17 and Saturday, June 4. The Council will work the Kroger at 6300 Creedmoor and the Kroger at 8345 Creedmoor Friday, Saturday and Sunday, April 1-3.

The Council submitted the final Form 4 2010 Operation LAMB Income Report in January 2011 showing that the Council had collected \$27,745.78 for the intellectually handicapped during 2010, netting some \$26,814.28 after the Tootsie Roll expense. The Council's funds will be added to the funds of four other local Councils and distributed to Raleigh agencies in February.

The Council's collection for 2010 was the highest ever collected, exceeding the State-set goal of \$26,656 easily. Last year the Council collected some \$25,897.27. Council LAMB collections have been declining over the past couple of years, presumably because of the economy. Based upon past precedent and the total collected for 2010, the Council's 2011 LAMB goal will be about \$28,000, a one percent increase.
