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FLAG RETIREMENT CEREMONY POSTPONED DUE BY WEATHER

The U.S. flag retirement ceremony to be conducted by Boy Scouts from Troop 352 has been postponed from the Council's Sept. 6 meeting until the Council's Nov. 8 meeting. Brother Tom McKemie, a senior Boy Scout leader with Troop 352, made the call to postpone the ceremony because of the weather and concern for the boys' safety.

Brother Jeff Rohman, Council coordinator for the project, gave Brother McKemie some 63 U.S. flags at the meeting and thanked eight Brother Knights who helped out with staffing in the Stewardship Center during the month of August collecting flags from Parishioners. The eight Knights put in an estimated 15 volunteer hours, according to Brother Rohman.

This is the second ceremony Boy Scout Troop 352 will conduct with All Saints Council. The first ceremony was conducted by about 30 members of the Troop in January 2010. The ceremony itself is carefully scripted and involves paying tribute to the flags being retired both individually (if their history is known) and collectively. The flags are first "disassembled" into the individual red and white stripes and the blue fields with white stars, whether the flags are constructed from individual pieces or not. If the flag is made of cotton, the pieces are then consumed by fire as Scouts carry each piece to a fire pit as a senior Scout reads aloud the rationale for how the flags have been. The red stripes are said to symbolize "the blood spilled in defense of the glorious nation," the white stripes "the burning tears shed by Americans who lost their sons" and the blue field "God's heaven under which we [the flags] fly." If the flag is made of nylon, the pieces are disassembled and then taken to a

recycling center. Burning the nylon flags just causes them to melt and emit potentially harmful gases into the atmosphere.

Council 9709 is the founding sponsor of Boy Scout Troop 352, a fact proclaimed by the Council's name being on the Troop banner. The Council supports the Troop's Eagle Scout candidates with grants, and the Grand Knight is a member of the Troop's advisory group.

FOR THE FIRST DEGREE KNIGHT . . . NONPAYMENT OF DUES

Members' timely payment of annual dues is essential to a Council, especially when it comes to achieving Star Council status. Knights who do not pay their dues on time are placed under "Knight Alert" after their dues are 30 days late and can be suspended for nonpayment after four months. Should the individual be an Insurance Member, he becomes "inactive" and remains on the Council rolls as long as his insurance remains in force. The loss of an Associate (Non-Insurance) or Insurance Member counts against Supreme Council Awards quotas.

Reinstatement occurs when a suspended member comes back into the Council from which he was suspended. Should he return and pay any arrearage within 90 days of his suspension, there will be no break in membership, and his return will negate the Supreme Council Awards quota loss recorded by his suspension.

Readmission applies to a suspended Associate Member when suspension has been between three months and seven years. The individual can apply to any Council, but he forfeits the prior years he served as a Knight as they count for Honorary or Honorary Life Membership unless those years total 25 or more consecutive years. A Knight readmitted to the Order counts toward Supreme Council Awards quotas.

Reactivation occurs in the case of an Insurance Member who re-enters the Order and is the same as **Readmission** above as regards prior years of membership and Supreme Council Awards quotas.

Reapplication applies to a former member who has been out of the Order for more than seven years. He may re-apply to any Council and need not retake his Degrees. For purposes of counting prior years of membership and Supreme Council Awards quotas, **Reapplication** is the same as **Readmission**.

Transfers are individuals who come from other Councils to a new Council, usually as a result of a relocation from one Parish to another. As they are current in their dues, they do not count for Supreme Council Awards quotas.

Withdrawals are granted when a Member submits a personal, signed resignation to the Council. The only stipulation is that he must be eligible for re-entry at the time of his withdrawal. Withdrawals do not maintain continuous membership and will count against a Council's Supreme Council Awards quotas.

COUNCIL ADDS FIRST NEW MEMBER FOR FY 2011-2012

Membership Director Brother Tru Hall escorted new Brother Keith Houchin to a 1st Degree Ceremony held August 21 by Pope John Paul II Council 13812 at St. Matthew's Catholic Church in Durham. Brother Houchin was recruited by Brother Tom DuPree and voted into the Council at the August business meeting.

Brother Houchin is the first new member to be recruited this fraternal year. All Saints Council 9709 has an assigned recruiting goal of 15 for fraternal year 2011-2012 based on its membership total at the end of fraternal year 2010-2011. Unfortunately, as a result of dues notices there have been four withdrawals to date, which means the original goal has increased to at least 19. Some 47 members have still not responded to a second dues notice and will be contacted by the Retention Committee in September.

Council 9709 will sponsor a 1st Degree Ceremony once a quarter for this fraternal year with the first ceremony being held in conjunction with the Oct. 4 meeting.

In order to qualify for Star Council, All Saints
Council 9709 will have to satisfy the requirements for three different awards. Besides recruiting at least 19 new members for the Father McGivney Award, the Council needs to add six new insurance members to qualify for the Founders Award and evidence of participation in activities under Church, Council, Community, Family, Youth and Pro-Life for the Colombian Award. The Council has already added one new insurance member this fraternal year, and qualifying for the Colombian Award has never been a problem for the Council.

34 ATTEND AUGUST 9 ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING

Some 34 Brother Knights from Council 9709 enjoyed pizza, fellowship and getting involved with the Council's activities at the annual organizational meeting. Brother Knights had the opportunity to pledge their support of various activities for the coming year.

Grand Knight Kent Siefkes reiterated his goals for the year. He wants to increase participation for new Knights from about 72 to 85 percent and for all Council members from 63 percent to 70 percent for fraternal year 2011-2012. He has also emphasized his desire to contribute to the spiritual formation of the Council's members and charged Council Lecturer Gabriele Monetti and Council Chaplain Fr. David McBriar with coming up with five-minute reflections for two-thirds of the year's meetings. Brother Monetti delivered the first "Good of the Order" presentation at the meeting, and Fr. David spoke at the September meeting. Brother Siefkes' last goal is to meet or exceed the Supreme goals for membership, new insurance members and activities.

The new Directors for this fraternal year were on hand to present their own goals and objectives for the year. Deputy Grand Knight Shawn Bayle will chair the Retention Committee made up of the three Trustees. He has also agreed to coordinate the Council's quarterly pancake breakfasts and the annual barbecue. Brother Troy Chaput will chair the Church Committee. Brother John Moster will head the Community Committee, and Brother Tim Stevens will continue to lead the Council's Operation LAMB effort as well as continue to serve as Council Director. Brother James Powers has volunteered his services as Family Director, and Brother Mike Wrzesien will continue as Youth Director and coordinate the Council's RBC Center fundraising activity. Grand Knight Kent Siefkes will keep his position as Director of the Pro-Life Committee, and Brother Tru Hall will continue as Membership Director.

Two Brothers proposed two new service opportunities for the Council this year: Catholic Parish Outreach and Habitat for Humanity. All Brother Knights are encouraged to visit the Council website and sign up for the new year's activities under "Events and Schedules."

FALL LAMB DRIVE TO BEGIN SEPT. 24-25

Council LAMB Director Tim Stevens has reserved the weekend of Sept. 24-25 at the Brier Creek Walmart for the start of the Council's fall Operation LAMB drive. The Council's collection to date of \$11,314.47 is about \$4,000 less than last year's effort at this point in the year. The State-set goal for All Saints Council this calendar year is \$28,578. Last year the Council collected \$27,745.78.



The Council will also be soliciting donations for Operation LAMB over the weekend of Oct. 7-9 at the

Sam's Club in Morrisville, the Harris Teeter at 6024 Falls of the Neuse Road Oct. 9 and the Harris Teeter at 9800 Falls of the Neuse Road Oct. 7-8. The Council also has Wednesday, Oct. 12, at the Harris Teeter in Morrisville from 3-9 p.m. and the Kroger's at 8345 Creedmoor Road the weekend of Oct. 14-16.

The sign up sheet for Operation LAMB is on the Council website. There are about 100 three-hour shifts to fill at the seven stores listed, about the same number of shifts as last year's fall drive.

"It may be the economy that has caused lower donations, but the agencies we support are still counting on us for help in meeting their very real needs," said Brother Stevens. "I hope every Brother will make the commitment to work at least one shift this fall."

Since its inception in 1974, the Operation LAMB program of North Carolina named after the biblical quotation, "... as you did it to one of the Least [Among] My Brethren, you did it to me." Matthew 25:40, has raised over \$20 million to assist citizens of North Carolina with intellectual disabilities.



KofC INSURANCE MILESTONES

From the May 2010 Columbia Magazine

- **1882** Father Michael J. McGivney's name is the first one listed in the insurance ledger, and he becomes the first insured member of the Order. The original insurance program was based on an assessment system. When a member died, the others were sent an assessment to pay based on three grades of payment.
- 1892 The Order establishes a Reserve Fund to guarantee financial solvency during epidemics.
- 1902 Sweeping reforms are made to the insurance program, including the implementation of a step-rate plan.
- 1940 An agency system is begun and five new insurance plans are adopted.
- 1944 The Order establishes the Juvenile Insurance Program for the sons of members.
- 1945 The first cash dividend is paid to policyholders.
- **1958** To further assist members and their families, the Order introduces spousal insurance products and coverage for members' daughters.
- 1960 The Order reaches \$1 billion of insurance in force and assets surpass \$170 million.
- 1975 A.M. Best bestows its first highest approval rating for the insurance program.
- 1977 Flexible retirement annuities are introduced to members.
- 1980 Total life insurance premiums surpass \$1 billion.
- **1982** The New Member Plan is introduced to encourage greater member participation in the Order's insurance program.
- **1985** Insurance in force reaches \$10 billion as assets surpass \$1.7 billion.
- 1989 The Order distributes more than \$100 million in life dividends.
- **1992** Insurance in force passes the \$20 billion mark. The Order receives its first AAA rating from Standard & Poor's.
