

COUNCIL MARCHES FOR LIFE IN RALEIGH AND WASHINGTON, D.C.

Six Knights from Council 9709 were among several thousand people who took to the streets of Raleigh Saturday, Jan. 14, for the annual North Carolina Right to Life Rally and March. Some 25 Knights from all over the state formed the color and honor guards for the March and led march participants from Nash Square past the State Legislature on Jones Street before returning to the Sacred Heart Cathedral grounds for some refreshments. Brother Tom DuPree marched in regalia with the Honor Guard. Fr. David McBriar, Council Chaplain, and Brothers Dick Bridges, Dick Novacek, Kent Siefkes, Dave Vogelpohl and Mike Wrzesien marched with the main body.

Bishop Michael Burbidge began the rally with the invocation and was particularly enthusiastic after coming from the youth rally held on the Sacred Heart Cathedral grounds prior to the rally in Nash Square. Some 690 youth attended that rally. The

number of young people at the rally and in the march underscored featured speaker National Right to Life Committee President Carol Tobias' comment that "the Pro-Life movement is getting younger while the other side is not." The other featured speakers at the rally included the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill Students for Life Director Christina Geradts and North Carolina State University Students for Life Director Teresa Pincus, further proof that young people in growing numbers favor the right to life.

Grand Knight Kent Siefkes and Brother Tom DuPree also traveled to Washington, D.C., Jan. 22-23, for the National Right to Life March and to visit and attend evening and morning prayer services with the seminarians supported by the Council's Refund Support Vocations Program. They departed from the St. Francis parking lot at noon, Sunday, Jan. 22, for Holy Name College in Silver Spring, Md., to visit with the seminarians. Overnight lodging, dinner and breakfast was included free at the College. Brothers DuPree and Siefkes were part of the Honor Guard with nine other Sir Nights for the North Carolina Mass for Life at the Basilica of the Immaculate Conception before the 39th annual National March for Life on the Capitol Mall. Brothers DuPree and Siefkes also had a quick one-on-one with N.C. Senator Richard Burr at the March.

All Saints Council is currently sponsoring three seminarians, and the annual trip to Washington, D.C., serves as a venue for presenting the seminarians with their annual \$500 stipend checks. Brothers Stephen DeWitt and Daniel Horan received their checks during the delegation's visit to Holy Name College. Brother Phil List, the third seminarian supported by All Saints Council, will receive his check by mail at Saint Charles Borromeo Seminary in Overbrook, N.Y., where he is studying to become a Priest.

FOR THE FIRST DEGREE KNIGHT . . . RSVP PROGRAM

Through the Knights of Columbus Refund Support Vocations Program (RSVP), Councils, Assemblies and Squires Circles "adopt" one or more seminarians or postulants and provide them with financial assistance and moral support. RSVP money is used by seminarians and those in religious formation for tuition and books, car insurance and maintenance, travel during vacations, emergency expenditures and other living expenses. Knights provide more than financial support, though. Members write letters to students, sponsor dinners for them, invite them to join the Order and, most importantly, pray for vocations.

Last year, financial help from 2,697 Councils, Assemblies and Circles to future Priests, Sisters and Brothers, exceeded \$2.8 million. Since 1981 the Order has provided more than \$49.9 million in aid through RSVP, helping more than 80,000 men and women follow their vocations.

Qualifying Councils and Assemblies receive a \$100 refund for every \$500 donated, up to a limit of \$2,000 donated to an individual, while the refund for Squires is \$20 for every \$100 donated. In the Philippines and Mexico, Councils and Assemblies receive the equivalent in local currency of \$50 for every \$250 donated.

Other vocations-related projects conducted by Supreme include: support for the missions of the national colleges for priestly training in Rome: the North American College, the Pontifical Canadian College and the Pontifical Mexican College; support for the American College in Louvain, Belgium; publication of the full-page color advertisements on the back cover of each issue of Columbia magazine that each month features pictures and a vocation narrative of a person who has chosen to answer God's call to the priesthood or religious life; funding to the Bishops' Conference of Cuba for a seminary there; assistance for the construction of a house of discernment for women religious in Brazil; financial help with renovations for the Polish Pontifical Institute in Rome, and for new construction of a seminary in Tlalpan, Mexico; financial support for an international meeting of Priests convened in Rome by the Vatican's Congregation for the Clergy; and a contribution to the U.S.-based Institute for Priestly Formation and Institute on Religious Life. *Source: Supreme Website*

STATE TASKS COUNCIL TO SELL 1,000 VACATION RAFFLE TICKETS



The North Carolina State Council has assigned All Saints Council 9709 a quota of 1,000 vacation raffle tickets to sell by April 28, 2012, an increase of 200 over fraternal year 2010-2011. The Council gets to keep \$2.50 from every \$5 ticket sold, something that could be very beneficial for Council 9709 this year. State uses the other \$2.50 from each ticket to cover its annual operating expenses.

"Selling as many tickets as we can will really help the Council this year," said Grand Knight Kent Siefkes. "Since

we have been unable to work at the RBC Center this season, these raffle tickets will provide the major income for the Council's General Fund this year."

The Council's two other main sources of revenue are already committed to other causes. The Council earmarks the proceeds from its annual barbecue to Catholic education, and LAMB funds are maintained in a separate State account for distribution to agencies supporting the intellectually handicapped.

Council 9709 sold some 777 tickets last fraternal year, earning some \$1,942.50 for the General Fund.

Brother Knights able to sell tickets to friends, neighbors and/or relatives should contact raffle ticket sales coordinator Brother Dick Bridges directly at 806-3816 or rbridges1971@aol.com to get tickets. The Council deadline for selling tickets is April 15, after which all unsold tickets, stubs and cash should be turned in to Brother Bridges.

The raffle drawing will take place in Asheville on Saturday, May 19, at the annual North Carolina Knights of Columbus Convention. The Grand Prize is a seven-day Alaska cruise for two sailing from either Seattle or Vancouver including airfare and \$700 cash. Second prize is a six-day, seven-night vacation in Honolulu, Hawaii, for two including airfare, hotel, transfers to/from the airport and the hotel, a Polynesian Cultural Center dinner/show, a sightseeing tour and \$500 cash. Third through seventh prize winners each receive \$200 cash. Ticket purchasers do not need to be present to win, and all winners will be contacted by the State Council directly. Last year's Grand Prize winner was David Deferie of Asheville, and second prize went to Dave Seifert from Raleigh. Brother Dave Bole sold the winning second prize ticket to his daughter's father-in-law last year.

The \$5 purchase price of the ticket is not tax deductible, and winners will need to pay applicable taxes, both federal and state, on the fair-market value of their winnings.

BROTHER DUPREE NAMED MALE VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR

Brother Tom DuPree of All Saints Council 9709 was named 2011 Knight of Columbus Veterans Affairs/Veterans Services (VAVS) Male Volunteer of the Year by Brother George Hanna, Senior Vice President, Fraternal Services. The memorandum announcing the selection was signed Dec 15, 2011, on behalf of Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson, Officers and the Board of Directors of the Knights of Columbus.

The memorandum details Brother DuPree's accomplishments as the VAVS Representative at the Durham Veterans Administration Medical Center for the past two years. Specifically, he is credited with more than doubling the number of regularly scheduled Knight volunteers and raising over \$21,000 in support of VAMC Recreational Therapy programs, including the National Wheelchair Games over the past three years and the donation of over 100 new coats for needy and homeless Veterans in response to Durham VAMC's "Operation Cold Front."

Brother DuPree is a Past Grand Knight of Council 9709 (2008-2010) and has served as Faithful Navigator of Bishop McGuinness Assembly 778. Besides working as the VAVS Representative for the eastern region of North Carolina, he is also the State LAMB Council Relations Director for the Eastern Region.

COUNCIL AND DISTRICT FREE THROWN CONTEST SET FOR FEB. 26



All Saints Council 9709 will hold its annual Youth Basketball Free Throw Championship Sunday, Feb. 26, in the Community Center gymnasium from 1-2:30 p.m. The Council is also hosting the District #9 Free Throw Championship in the gym beginning at 3 p.m. All boys and girls in the community ages 10-14 are invited to participate.

Contestants will compete by age and gender. Youth ages 10-11 will use a women's regulation-sized basketball and shoot from the 12-foot line. Girls ages 12-14 will use a woman's regulation-sized basketball and shoot from the regulation foul line 15 feet from the basket. Boys ages 12-14 will use a regulation-sized basketball and shoot from the regulation foul line. Each contestant will get three warm-up free throws followed by 15 consecutive free throw attempts for record. Competition will continue until there is a winner in each age group by gender.

"This is really a lot of fun, both for the participants as well as the volunteers," said Brother Wrzesien. "We need registrars, score keepers and ball chasers."

The State Free Throw Contest will be hosted by Pius X Council 3498 at the Fairchild Center Gymnasium, 827 S. Graham-Hopedale Road in Burlington. Competition will begin at 12:30 p.m. The top three contestants in each of age groups by gender will receive trophies.

According to Supreme, some 130,000 sharpshooters competed in 3,000 local contests last year.
