New Champion Crowned at TFS Spelling Bee

The Knights of Columbus was honored to support The Franciscan School 2021 Spelling Bee. The Spelling Bee, held annually for students in the 3rd through 8th grade, allows students at TFS to showcase their spelling skills, while building their vocabulary and grammar. After the classroom competition, two students from each grade level earned the right to represent their class at the school-wide spelling bee. The event was held on Tuesday, February 2nd in Fellowship Hall at St. Francis of Assisi Church. Mrs. Marcy Henehan, 6th Grade Teacher at TFS, was the coordinator.

Due to the global pandemic, the structure of the TFS Spelling Bee was modified to allow in-person and virtual contestants. There were five students present in Fellowship Hall, and seven students attending via a Zoom session. The students, and the attendees, including Fr. Jim Sabak, Principal Mike Watson, Vice Principal Dawn Smith (K-5), and Vice Principal Colette Dziadul (Middle School), were seated in accordance with socially distanced guidelines.

The students displayed impressive spelling skills. The Spelling Bee went 31 rounds, with 8th grader Rachel Setia earning the crown of TFS Spelling Bee Champion. The runner-up was 6th grader Isabel Cantu-Melo.

This is the 8th year the Knights from the All Saints Council sponsored the TFS Spelling Bee. Novena for Life/March for Life



The Knights of Columbus has organized a “Novena for the Cause of Life” to be prayed over the nine days from Oct. 4 to Oct. 12 during the U.S. Catholic Church’s annual observance of October as Respect Life Month.

“Live the Gospel of Life” is this year’s theme for the month, prompted by commemorations of the 25th anniversary of St. John Paul II’s encyclical “The Gospel of Life” (*“Evangelium Vitae”*), which was issued March 25, 1995.

The Knights novena begins on Respect Life Sunday, which is Oct. 4 this year. The full novena can be found on the [Knights website](#).



Each day has a quote from Pope Francis on some aspect of the sanctity of life. Novena participants are asked to reflect on the quote and then pray a decade of the rosary, concluding with a prayer by St. John Paul from his encyclical, which begins: O Mary, bright dawn of the new world, Mother of the living, to you do we entrust the cause of life.”

“The cause of life is today’s preeminent priority, as Pope Francis indicated when meeting with the US bishops in January,” Supreme Knight Carl Anderson said Sept. 22 in a statement announcing the novena.

Novena for Life is required to qualify for the Columbian Award. Overview The protection of life is a sustained prayer intention of the Church, and in particular of the Knights of Columbus. Knights remain firmly committed to defending the right to life of every human being – from the moment of conception to natural death.

VACCINATIONS AT ST. FRANCIS



St. Joseph Primary Care Clinic and the staff at St. Francis of Assisi teamed up to dispense the long-awaited Covid-19 vaccine. Brothers from our Council volunteered to control the traffic in the church parking lot, then helped direct the recipients to Fellowship/Clare Hall to receive their injections. Over a period of weeks, there were several vaccination dates, February 13, 27 and March 13 and 27..No doubt, these events achieved outstanding results by vaccinating over 800 people. The worrisome age group of 65 and over received their first and second shots. Also vaccinations were distributed to the teachers at TFS, Sycamore and Goddard Schools. While people over 65 were anxiously waiting for their vaccination, these sessions resolved a lot of their concern. Thanks go to St. Joseph Primary Care, a not-for-profit clinic founded by Thuhong Trinh, MD and her husband Peter, whose mission is to offer health care to anyone, especially the poor. MARCH ADOPT A HIGHWAY

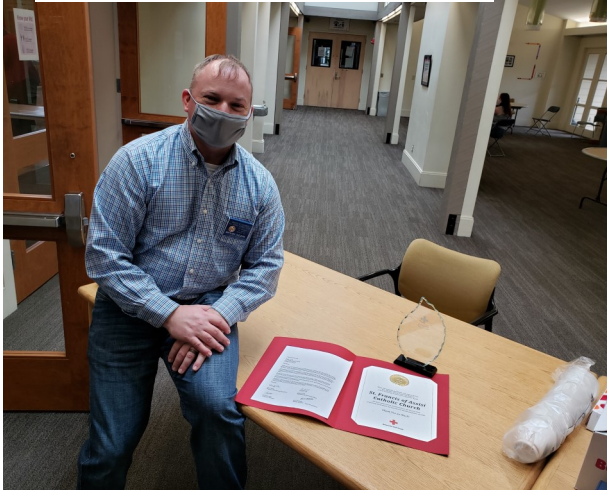

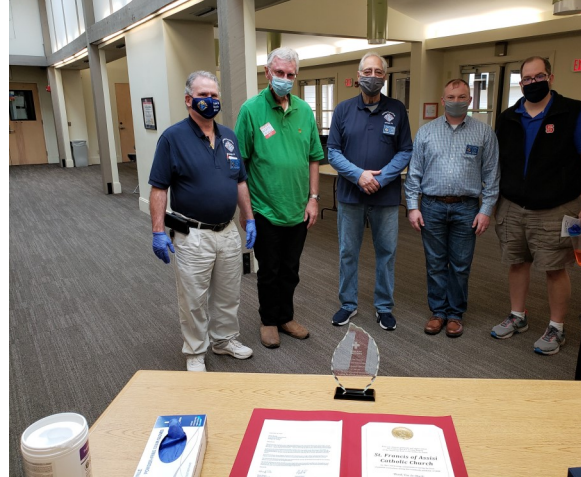

After completing last year with a total of seven Red Cross Blood Drives when the need for blood was critical, our Council starts 2021 with its first drive on March 27. Last year's record collection of nearly 750 units of blood will be hard to beat. However, our Grand Knight, Bryan Kozak, who personally directs the drives, will not shy away from the challenge. We started the year with 140 units in March. Each drive is achieved with the help of a group of Knights whose work begins on the day of the drive at 5:30 am by setting up Fellowship/Clare Hall with chairs and tables and continuing throughout the day checking-in donors, directing them to waiting areas while maintaining proper protocols dictated by the pandemic. Future Blood Drives at St. Francis will continue depending upon opportunity and circumstances.
