THE FR. DAVID MCBRIAR LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

The criteria established by our Officers in order to be considered for the Lifetime Achievement Award requires a Knight, year after year, to far exceed Council expectations. The achievements are based on the principles of the Knights of Columbus: charity, unity and fraternity. Dino Pinelli has consistently applied these principles, often without solicitation and always without seeking recognition. Here are a few examples: he raised funds (\$4,100) for the ravaged people of Italy who experienced a 6.2 earthquake in 2016. He raises funds, year after year, for the Veterans Life Center in Butner, NC whose goal is to help at-risk veterans suffering from social and personal problems. He has supported our Council in many ways by buying large quantities of the State Raffle tickets every year, by helping the Council raise funds for the Taste of Italy dinners at St. Francis, by offering low prices for the Council's Christmas and Valentine family dinners at his restaurant, Capri. The list can continue but we know that Dino Pinelli is a well-deserved recipient of our Council's first Fr. David McBriar Lifetime Achievement Award.
